NGO LEADERSHIP WORKSHOP BRATISLAVA

MAY 26-30, 2025

In May 2025, civil society leaders from 11 countries across Central and Eastern Europe came together in Bratislava, Slovakia for the 14th NGO Leadership Workshop — a special edition marking the program's 10-year anniversary.

Throughout a dynamic, immersive week, participants engaged in impactful training designed to help them lead more effectively in increasingly complex and high-pressure environments. At a time when civic space is shrinking and democratic values are under pressure, the need for resilient, well-connected NGO leadership has never been more critical.

Participants represented organizations working in human rights, the rule of law, and democracy building. Sessions addressed urgent leadership challenges such as navigating change, building resilient teams, making strategic decisions under pressure, managing stress, and motivating employees.

Some of the most powerful moments took place beyond the classroom sessions — over shared meals, in informal evening conversations, and during our off-site retreat to the nearby Slovak countryside. Participants forged cross-border relationships and laid the groundwork for continued cooperation and support. The NGO Leadership Workshop is now 350 alumni strong!

As we mark this 10-year milestone, we are deeply grateful for the vision and support of Ronald Weiser, former U.S. Ambassador to Slovakia and University of Michigan Regent emeritus. Ambassador Weiser's commitment to civil society and democratic values has made these workshops possible from the beginning. His belief in the importance of a strong and vibrant civil society continues to inspire and sustain this growing network.

DAY

RESILIENT LEADERSHIP: STRATEGIES FOR STABILITY AND MOTIVATION IN NGOS

INSTRUCTOR: Julie Felker, (William Davidson Institute, University of Michigan, USA)

This session focused on equipping NGO leaders with the tools to lead through uncertainty, build trust, sustain motivation, and empower teams. Through discussions and hands-on exercises, participants developed leadership strategies for maintaining stability during difficult times.

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BUILDING PERSONAL SUSTAINABILITY & RESILIENCE IN AN UNCERTAIN WORLD

INSTRUCTOR: Olivia Hurbanová (HighBrows, Slovakia)

This session explored how leaders can develop personal sustainability and emotional agility. Participants gained insights into how stress and uncertainty affect leadership performance and learned practical strategies for maintaining focus, resilience, and well-being.

ADAPTIVE LEADERSHIP: NAVIGATING CHANGE IN NGO MANAGEMENT

INSTRUCTOR: Frank C. Schultz (University of California, Berkeley, USA)

This session introduced the concept of adaptive leadership and explored tools NGO leaders can use to help their organizations respond effectively to ongoing change. Participants assessed their leadership styles and considered how to adapt to shifting internal and external conditions.



DAY 4

MASTERING DECISION MAKING: ENHANCING NGO IMPACT IN DYNAMIC ENVIRONMENTS

INSTRUCTOR: Frank C. Schultz (University of California, Berkeley, USA)

This session focused on making strategic decisions under pressure. Participants examined decision-making frameworks, reflected on their own leadership tendencies, and learned how to create cultures that support thoughtful, mission-driven decision making.

A former MBA instructor at the University of Michigan, he has taught around the world, including in Japan, India, Saudi Arabia, China, Brazil, and across Europe.

Developed the ability to manage stress, maintain focus during challenges, and enhance personal well-being to improve leadership effectiveness

Acquired the skills and tools needed to adapt their strategies and leadership styles to the dynamics of challenging environments

Refined their decision-making abilities to make crucial, long-term choices that steer their organizations toward sustainability and greater societal impact

Learned how to cultivate an organizational culture that embraces and drives change, enhancing adaptability and innovation

Gained practical knowledge about EU funding mechanisms for NGOs

Expanded their regional networks and cross-border collaboration opportunities

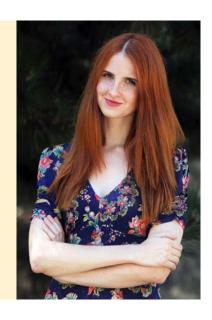
